About the Survey

- Total N=9,405 voters in the 2024 presidential election (+/- 1.01%)
 - N= 1,500 White (+/- 2.5%)
 - N= 1,850 African American (+/- 2.3%)
 - N= 3,750 Latino (+/- 1.6%), including N=790 Puerto Rican respondents
 - N= 1,805 AAPI (+/- 2.3%)
 - N= 500 Native American (+/- 4.4%)
- Field Dates: October 18 November 4, 2024 among confirmed voters
- Survey available in 6 languages, according to respondent preference
 - English, Spanish, Chinese, Tagalog, Korean, Vietnamese
- Mixed mode 25% live telephone interviews, 25% text invites; 50% online panels
- > All respondents voted in the 2024 election

Key Findings

- 1. All voters of color voted <u>majority Democrat</u> in 2024, even as Black, Latino and AAPI voters did vote *more* Republican than in 2020
 - Noticeable gender gaps did exist within each racial and ethnic community which is important to understand
 - HOWEVER, to be clear: the national exit polls are WRONG about Latino men. They did shift more Republican, however a majority
 of Latino men continued to vote Democrat in 2024
- 2. This was a national "mood" election in which Republican gains were prevalent in every single demographic group, and across virtually every state
 - Young voters of every racial and ethnic group shifted more Republican as compared to 2020
 - By raw population, the pro-Trump shift among White Men was the single largest shift in raw votes, given their large population share
 - White Women continued to vote majority-Republican by the same margins as almost every single previous cycle
- 3. This was not a policy-agenda election, most voters reject the Project 2025 agenda and a majority of voters continue to support policy proposals more aligned with Democrats
 - Democrats lost the votes of many Americans who voice support for Democratic policy proposals
 - This election was about anti-establishment **mood**, and continued concern over high costs
 - Trump was not elected behind a policy mandate and rapid policy implementation will be met with opposition

Key Findings

- 4. This exit poll, and virtually all polling in 2024 confirms that voters do not want trickle-down economic solutions that make rich corporations richer, voters are asking for equity in public policy
 - Over 75% support requiring all corporations with over \$1B in profit to pay a 15% tax
 - Over 80% support a law to ban price gouging
 - Over 90% support allowing Medicare to negotiate to lower prices on prescription drugs

5. A clear majority of the 2024 American electorate supports:

- Protecting access to abortion and reproductive rights
- Immigration reform that includes both bipartisan border security and a path to citizenship or long-term undocumented
- Investing in a clean energy economy and taking action to address extreme weather

6. Voters of color continue to be worried about white supremacy, division and violence

- More than 60% are worried the Trump election will promote hate, division and violence
- More than 60% are worried politicians encourage white nationalists and hate crimes


Economic concerns were top priorities for voters across groups

On the whole, what are the most important issues that you want Congress and the President to address? (Select up to three. Top six issues reported, sorted highest to lowest)



The majority of non-White voters think Democrats would be better on their top priority issue, White voters believe Republicans would better


Which party do you think would do a better job at addressing the issue that is MOST important to you?



More voters believe Democrats are concerned about them and their communities. The majority of minority voters see Republicans as indifferent or hostile to them.




House Vote

Senate Vote






In the election for President, did you vote for the Democratic candidate Kamala Harris, Republican candidate Donald Trump, or someone else?




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




Presidential Vote: Gender and Race




Presidential Vote: Gender, Race, and Age

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



By wide margins, voters support immigration policy that includes a path to citizenship over an enforcement-only approach


Considering these different views on immigration issues, which are you more likely to support?
